Pakistan's standing in the global rankings

Overview

Pakistan observed a slight improvement in the overall international rankings in 2021 covering socio-economic and political outcomes of the country. Several elements complemented the prospects including successful democratic transition, efficient counter-terrorism measures leading to enhanced peace and security, and foreign direct investment inflows under CPEC, among others. Albeit, decoupling economic growth from human development suggests that the country needs to enhance its scores in health, education and standard of living by ensuring political will, equitable financing and efficient governance to ensure parallel growth for marginalized segments as well. Civil and political liberties must grow hand in hand to ensure a conducive environment for democratic dialogue and accountability which ultimately supports its nation building process.

DEMOCRACY INDEX

Pakistan was placed at the 104th spot among 167 states on the global Democracy Index 2021, compiled by the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU).

National Assembly panel seeks clear timeline to complete PIA bidding process

The National Assembly Standing Committee on Privatisation sought a clear timeline to complete the ongoing bidding process for the privatisation of Pakistan International Airlines Corporation Ltd (PIACL) and directed that the process be accelerated.

The committee, headed by Muhammad Farooq Sattar, asked the privatisation commission to present the timeline at its next meeting. The committee also emphasised safeguarding PIA employees' jobs before the sale.

It called for retaining staff based on performance and merit and ensuring benefits, such as pensions and gratuity, are processed fairly. Officials were instructed to consult the PIA employees' union and address their concerns to ensure a transparent process.



The privatisation commission has already approved a transaction structure to sell a stake of 51 per cent to 100pc in PIACL, along with management control.

Four bidders have been pre-qualified for the sale: Lucky Cement Consortium, Arif Habib Corporation Consortium, Fauji Fertilizer Company Limited Air Blue Limited.

According to the commission, the

pre-qualified bidders now have access to a virtual data room, can conduct site visits and participate in the pre-bid conference. Negotiations are ongoing to finalise commercial terms, advancing the privatisation process.

In a separate matter, an additional secretary for the power division told the committee that the government has begun the phased privatisation of public sector power generation companies (GENCOs), under a 2024–29 programme.

He said only operational plants will be offered, with the Guddu (747MW) and Nandipur (525MW) facilities identified for privatisation once pre-conditions are met. Non-operational units are proposed for delisting from the programme.

The privatisation commission advised GENCOs may dispose of old, non-functional assets with the board and ministry's approval. The committee also sought a detailed report from the power ministry on the installation of 1.5 million smart meters nationwide and requested a formal briefing for Karachi's elected representatives about the project's progress and to explain why Karachi is not included in the current phase.

Dialogue is way to resolve issue, NA speaker tells opposition

National Assembly (NA) Speaker Ayaz Sadiq has again ostensibly made an offer of talks to the opposition, telling a group of parliamentarians visiting him on Friday that dialogue was the way to resolve issues.

He made similar offers to facilitate dialogue between the government and the opposition, the PTI, in the past as well. But no substantial headway has been made so far and differences between the two sides largely remain unresolved.

A handout issued by the NA Secretariat said Mr Sadiq met opposition members of both houses of Parliament in his chamber in Parliament House soon after the adjournment of the NA session due to lack of quorum.

The visiting opposition members included Senator Allama Raja Nasir Abbas, Senator Faisal Javed, former NA speaker Asad Qaiser and PTI Chairman Barrister Gohar Ali Khan. MNAs Iqbal Afridi, Atif Khan, Sardar Latif Khosa and Jamal Ahsan Khan.

"Our bond of brotherhood and mutual respect is greater than politics. I have been in contact with you brothers since 2014. Politics does not last a lifetime it ends eventually," said the speaker according to the handout.

Mr Sadiq said the members of Parliament "should have a relationship that lasts throughout life".

The speaker further stated that he had always advocated for dialogue, stressing that dialogue was the means to resolve issues.

Sources said the PTI lawmakers asked Speaker Sadiq to announce the new opposition leader in the house. The PTI members have been protesting the delay in the appointment of Mehmood Khan Achakzai as the opposition leader.

During the previous NA session, the speaker had declared that matter was sub judice.

PTI's Barrister Gohar, during the meeting, raised the issue of PTI founder Imran Khan's family members not being allowed to meet the incarcerated leader, said the statement.

It added that the opposition members "appreciated" the speaker's efforts to facilitate dialogue between the two sides. The matter of talks between the opposition, mainly the PTI, and the government has been in the news since last year



After more than a year of heightened tensions, the two sides had commenced dialogue in the last week of December last year to bring down political temperatures. But despite weeks of negotiations, the dialogue process stalled on major issues the formation of two judicial commissions to probe the protests of May 9, 2023 and Nov 26, 2024, and the release of PTI prisoners.

The PML-N government had once again extended a dialogue offer to the opposition PTI in February as NA Speaker Sadiq insisted that the option of talks had never been dropped.

However, a day after the PM made the offer, the PTI refused it, with party leader Asad Qaiser asking how they could enter a dialogue with the government when the rulers had stepped up the crackdown on the PTI.

Mr Qaiser alleged the government had

started raids to round up the PTI workers, and dozens of them had reportedly been arrested across the country.

In early August, the dialogue offer was again extended by government ministers and Speaker Sadiq during a debate on the Kashmir issue in the NA.

The PTI members welcomed the offer for talks but questioned the government's authority to initiate dialogue.

More recently, Mr Sadiq reiterated his offer on Nov 13 to facilitate a dialogue between the government and the opposition parties.

The offer was made by the speaker at a time when the opposition members belonging to the PTI were protesting in the assembly during the passage of the 27th Constitutional Amendment Bill

Pakistan, Bahrain pledge to deepen economic, defence ties

Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif reiterated Pakistan's commitment to deepening ties with the Kingdom of Bahrain, based on shared faith and mutual respect.

The prime minister, who is in Bahrain on a two-day official visit, met King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa in Manama and reaffirmed the strong and historic partnership between the two countries, the PM Office said.

Discussing economic relations, the prime minister underlined Pakistan's desire to expand trade and investment and said bilateral trade was set to grow with the Pakistan-GCC Free Trade Agreement, which is at an advanced stage of finalisation.

He invited Bahraini investors to explore opportunities in Pakistan through the Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC), especially in food security, information technology, construction, mining, tourism and healthcare.

The prime minister appreciated Bahrain's support for the more than 150,000 Pakistanis living there and thanked the king for pardoning Pakistani prisoners.

Both sides reaffirmed the importance of their longstanding de-



fence partnership and agreed to deepen cooperation in training, logistics, manpower and defence production. They reviewed the encouraging momentum in bilateral ties and agreed to further enhance cooperation in political, economic, defence and cultural fields.

The situation in Gaza also came under discussion. Both sides agreed that peace and stability were long overdue for the people of Gaza who had suffered for decades.

PM Shehbaz congratulated Bahrain on securing a non-permanent seat on the UN Security Council for the 2026-27 term and expressed Pakis¬tan's readiness for close coordination during its tenure

The meeting also focused on economic cooperation. The prime minister noted the potential to raise bilateral trade, currently over \$550 million, to \$1 billion honour upon his arrival at Al-Qudaibiya Palace.

Meeting with crown prince PM Shehbaz also met Crown Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa. The meeting concluded with confidence that the discussions would translate into tangible outcomes and further elevate Pakistan-Bahrain relations across strategic, economic, security and people-to-people spheres.

According to state broadcaster PTV, the premier received a warm welcome at the Manama airport by Crown Prince and PM Sal-

man, Deputy PM Khalid bin Abdullah Al Khalifa, Foreign Minister Dr Abdullatif bin Rashid Al Zayani, and senior members of the Bahraini leadership.

The Pakistani delegation includes Deputy PM and FM Ishaq Dar, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi, Information Minister Attaullah Tarar, Minister of State for Railways Bilal Azhar Kayani, and other senior officials.

"This visit reflects the longstanding cordial relations between the Kingdom of Bahrain and Pakistan, with the aim of promoting a results-oriented and strategic partnership between the two countries," PTV said.

"The visit will strengthen traditionally warm and cordial relations, chart new avenues of partnership, and deepen people-to-people connections, which will contribute to mutually beneficial cooperation," it added.

Last month, the two countries agreed to strengthen bilateral cooperation in different fields during the first meeting of the Pakistan-Bahrain Parliamentary Friendship Group.

PM Shehbaz reaffirms Pakistan's commitment to peace



Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif reiterated that Pakistan, like its Azerbaijani and Turkish brothers, seeks peace but made it clear that no one will ever be allowed to challenge the country's sovereignty or undermine its territorial integrity.

Cybersecurity Act essential to national security, says IT minister



Federal Minister for Information Technology (IT) and Telecom Shaza Fatima Khawaja said the Cybersecurity Act 2025 was essential for national security and reflected the government's whole-ofnation approach to cybersecurity, marking a major reform initiative.

She noted that the Act will establish the National Cybersecurity Authority (NCA) to lead nationwide incident response and threat intelligence, while expansion of the Pakistan Computer Emergency Response Team (PKCERT), and the development of secure digital public infrastructure under the Digital Economy Enhancement Project (Deep) will further strengthen national cyber resilience.

Ms Khawaja was addressing a gathering at FAST National University, Islamabad, on the theme 'Securing Pakistan's Digital Frontier: CyberShield, Policy & the Future'. The event was hosted by the FAST Public Policy and Research Society (FPPRS).

She added that Pakistan's longterm objective is to build a cyber-resilient, innovation-driven digital nation where secure infrastructure, technological excellence, and human capital development advance together.

The minister underscored that Pakistan's digital transformation is accelerating at an unprecedented pace, bringing with it the critical responsibility of safeguarding national digital infrastructure and citizen data.

She highlighted Pakistan's Tier-1 ranking in the ITU Global Cyber-security Index as a reflection of the collective commitment of the government, academia, and youth to-

ward building a secure digital future. The minister said Pakistan is rapidly advancing toward AI-driven cybersecurity, dark-web moni-toring, and cloud security under the Cloud-First Policy, along with secure digital identity frameworks.

She also referred to the recent Marka-i-Haq, calling it a defining moment in which the armed forces, national institutions, and cyber experts stood united with remarkable resilience.

She emphasised that Pakistan's effective and coordinated cyber warfare response during this period demonstrated exceptional national strength and technological capability, adding that Marka-i-Haq proved the cyber domain is the first line of defence in the modern era, and Pakistan has shown it can safeguard its digital frontiers with confidence and competence.

The minister also toured FAST-NU Islamabad's IC Design Lab along with Director Dr Waseem Shahzad, Dean Dr Sadia Nadeem, and Fast Public Policy and Research Society (FPPRS) President Zainab Inam Cheema, and met scholars enrolled in Ignite's flagship training initiative, "Training in IC Design & Verification."

Under this Ignite-funded programme, 30 young engineers including seven female participants are undergoing a rigorous 10-month training course covering IC design, verification, and fabrication processes.

Implemented by FAST-NU, the programme offers hands-on training aligned with global semiconductor industry standards.

Ruling allies green-light 27th Amendment draft

Amid a boycott by opposition lawmakers, a joint meeting of the Senate and the National Assembly's law and justice standing committees approved the 27th Constitutional Amendment Bill with minor changes.

The bill aims to set up a federal constitutional court and grant permanent immunity to the president as well as lifetime status to the field marshal rank, amid criticism that the amendment will erode the judiciary's independence.

Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar, who also attended the meeting, said all key amendments, including changes to Article 243, were amicably approved by both committees. In response to a question about amendments to Article 243, Mr Dar said that all the amendments have been approved. The said article pertains to the military command structure.

Senator Farooq H. Naek, who was presiding over the meeting, said the bill was adopted with minor changes. He said that the committees empowered him and the law minister to make a couple of amendments.

The committees, however, de-

ferred the proposals of the Muttahida Qaumi Movement (MQM) seeking to amend Article 140 related to local governments as well as the Awami National Party's (ANP) amendment for changing the name of the province.

The ANP submitted a proposal to rename Khyber Pakhtunkhwa by removing 'Khyber', arguing that Khyber is a district and other provinces do not include district names in provincial titles. Likewise, the Balochistan National Party's proposed amendment to increase the seats in the province was also deferred.

Earlier in the day, ANP's Hidayatullah Khan had told reporters that the committee had sought time until tomorrow (Monday) to decide on his party's suggestion for changing the name of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa.

Meanwhile, Law Minister Azam Nazeer Tarar told reporters it was dec-ided that provinces be taken into confidence on changing the province's name. MQM-P's suggestion regarding local governments was also discussed, he said, adding that it was decided that provinces be taken into confidence on changing the prov-



ince's name. Mr Tarar further said that the report of the committees would be tabled before the Senate.

The standing committees met on Sunday to discuss the proposed bill for the 27th Constitutional Amendment a day after it was tabled in the Senate. This bill was approved by the federal cabinet on Saturday hours before it was presented in the upper house of parliament. As Senator Farooq H. Naek chaired the meeting, the PTI, the Jamiat Ulema-i-Islam (JUI-F) and the Majlis Wahdat-i-Muslimeen (MWM) continued their boycott of the parliamentary committee.

Referring to the JUI-F's absence, the law minister had stated its members had informed the committee on Saturday about their party's policy. He emphasised that parliamentary parties should utilise their right to vote, rather than boycotting the process altogether. The opposition alliance Tehreek Tahafuz-i-Ayeen-i-Pakistan (TTAP), which includes the PTI, announced a nationwide protest movement against the 27th Amendment, urging the people to take a stand against the "extremely dark and dangerous" change in the Constitution.

Separately, PPP's MNA Kasim Gilani, in a tweet summarised, that the 27th Constitutional Amend-ment "mainly touches 5 key areas: establishment of the Federal Const-itutional Court, transfer of judges (Article 200), fixing the KP Senate election anomaly, [two per cent] cabinet size increase on smaller provinces' demand (Article 130(6), [and] amendments in Article 243 on defence services & presidential immunity".

Pakistan extends airspace ban for Indian aircraft

The Pakistan Airports Authority (PAA) has extended the airspace restrictions on Indian aircraft for another month, till December 24.

The new ban for Indian aircraft has been notified just four days before a previous one is set to expire, according to a notice to airmen (Notam) issued. The latest restriction went into effect from 2:50pm Pakistan time on November 19 to 4:59am on December 24, the notice said.

The ban will apply to all India-registered aircraft as well as any aircraft operated, owned, or leased by Indian airlines or operators, including military flights. The airspace closure applies from ground level up to unlimited altitude.

India and Pakistan have closed

their airspaces to each other's airlines since tensions between them escalated in April in the wake of an attack in occupied Kashmir's Pahalgam that killed 26 people. Last month, Islamabad extended the airspace ban till November 24. Pakistan's airspace is divided into two flight information regions (FIRs) Karachi and Lahore, according to a Pakistan Civil Aviation Authority (PCAA) document from 2022. The Notam applies to both the Karachi (OPKR) and Lahore (OPLR) FIRs.

On April 24, in response to India's decision to suspend the Indus Waters Treaty after the Pahalgam attack, Pakistan had announced a series of measures, including the closure of its airspace to all India-owned or Indian-operated airlines.



It may be noted that due to the financial toll of a ban on Indian carriers flying over Pakistan, Air India is lobbying the Indian government to convince China to let it use a sensitive military airspace zone in Xinjiang to shorten routes.

For Air India, the country's only carrier with a major international network, fuel costs have risen by as much as 29 per cent and journey times by up to three hours on

some long-haul routes, Reuters reported, citing a document submitted to Indian officials in late October.

The airline, owned by Tata Group and Singapore Airlines, estimated the Pakistan airspace closure's impact on its profit before tax at \$455 million annually — a significant amount given its fiscal 2024-25 loss stood at \$439m.

Born in Karachi on November 24, 1952, Parveen Shakir began writing poetry at a young age. Alongside her poetic journey, her academic achievements were equally remarkable. She earned a degree in English literature and linguistics, and later completed her Masters in Public Administration from Harvard University. A particularly notable moment in her career came when, during the CSS exam, one of the questions featured her poetry—a testament to her widespread popularity and literary stature. Parveen Shakir brought a refreshing, unique voice to Urdu poetry, describing love, feminine emotions, loneliness, fragrance, and the subtle nuances of relationships with such depth that readers were often captivated by the sweetness of her words. Her acclaimed poetry collections include Khushboo, Sad Barg, Khod Kalami, Ankar, and Mah-e-Tamm. Her first collection, Khushboo, brought her nationwide fame and earned her the prestigious Adamji Award. Later, the Government of Pakistan honoured her with the Pride of Performance Award in recognition of her literary contributions. Even today, Parveen Shakir's words continue to resonate in the hearts of her readers, with the fragrance of her poetry still fresh. The poetess of love, fragrance, and emotion has left a timeless legacy. Shakir's work is deeply rooted in feminism, romanticism, and the critique of social stigmas. She was one of the first women poets to use the term larki (girl) in her writings, challenging the tradi-



tionally male-dominated space of Urdu poetry. Her poetry reflects the feminine perspective on love, romance, longing, separation, and

intimacy, making her an iconic figure in Urdu literature.

He later became best known for his work on the hit TV show 'Fifty-Fifty', even contributing to its scripts alongside fellow comedian Majid Jahangir after the original writer, Anwar Maqsood had a disagreement with the cast in 1981. Ismail Tara,

born Muhammad Ismail Merchant on November 16, 1949, in Karachi was a celebrated Pakistani actor and comedian. He began his journey in the performing arts in 1964, building a versatile career across stage, television, and film. Tara gained widespread fame in the 1980s for his satirical comedy show 'Fifty-Fifty', which became a landmark in Pakistani television. He also appeared in numerous films, taking on a variety of roles that showcased his comedic and acting talents. Over the course of his career, he was honoured with the Nigar Award five times for his exceptional contributions to entertainment. Among his other well-known works were television dramas such as Rubber Band, Yeh Zindagi Hai, One-Way Ticket, Delhi Colony, Ismail Time, along with numerous stage performances that delighted audiences. Ismail Tara passed away on November 24, 2023, in Karachi at the age of 73, after battling kidney disease, leaving behind a rich legacy in Pakistan's entertainment industry.

Pakistan, Iran look to align on major fronts

Ali Ardeshir Larijani, secretary of Iran's Supreme National Security Council, discussed ways to deepen economic cooperation, besides coordinating positions on regional and international developments, particularly the Gaza peace plan, in meetings with Pakistan's civilian leadership.

The top Iranian security official, who began a two-day visit to Islamabad by holding talks with President Asif Ali Zardari, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, National Assembly Speaker Ayaz Sadiq and Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar, is scheduled to meet Chief of Army Staff Field Marshal Asim Munir and National Security Adviser and ISI chief Lt Gen Asim Malik

The visit is focused on reviewing bilateral ties, pursuing pending agreements and discussing regional developments, including those in the Muslim world.

After landing in Islamabad, Mr Larijani told reporters "changing conditions of the region necessitate enhanced cooperation across multiple fields", while noting Pakistan's "privileged position" in shaping regional security.

Gaza peace on the table as Larijani discusses regional, global issues with civilian leadership; will meet army, intel chiefs today

The trip comes as Iran expressed reservations about US President Donald Trump's Gaza plan, now moving into its implementation phase after being adopted by the UN Security Council on Nov 17. The initiative includes an international stabilisation force for Gaza, a move Tehran fears could entrench foreign military involvement. Pakistan has supported the plan and is seen as a potential contributor to the force.

Though the various statements on the top security council official's meetings by the Pakistani side didn't say much on discussions about Gaza peace plan, the Iranian official in a post on X at the end of the day, conveyed greetings of Iranian Supreme Leader Aya-



tollah Khamenei to "honourable people of Pakistan" for supporting Iran during the 12-day war with Israel and said it showed the "firm and principled thinking of the Pakistani people".

In what many saw a possible balance act, Mr Larijani in the same post on X said, "We extend our gratitude to the government, the parliament, and the armed forces of Pakistan."

The PM Office said Shehbaz Sharif and Mr Larijani exchanged views on major regional and international developments and "stressed the importance of coordinated efforts to promote peace and stability."

The premier expressed appreciation for Iran's engagement, while the Iranian official thanked Pakistan for its role in advocating dialogue and diplomacy for peaceful settlement of disputes, possibly a reference to Islamabad's role of a messenger between Tehran and Washington.

The two sides agreed that a delegation led by Deputy PM and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar would soon visit Tehran to advance cooperation, particularly in agriculture and connectivity.

The Foreign Office said Mr Dar and Mr Larijani reaffirmed their commitment to strengthening bilateral ties and expanding cooperation on regional and international issues.

In comments to Iran's state news agency IRNA, the deputy premier said he held "detailed and frank discussions" with Mr Larijani,

adding he was "very pleased" with the visit. The security official told IRNA the talks covered economic progress, ways to expand cooperation, and regional and international developments.

During his call on President Zardari, cooperation in energy, commerce and railways were discussed.

The president underscored Pakistan's desire to boost trade with Iran and pressed for strengthening the rail link to facilitate commerce and travel, especially for religious pilgrims. He emphasised the need for a "mutually workable solution" on the stalled Iran-Pakistan gas pipeline, citing Pakistan's growing energy needs, and welcomed technical discussions held recently in Islamabad.

Mr Larijani said directives issued after the Iranian President Pezeshkian's visit to Pakistan in August including for preferential access for Pakistani products had set the path toward achieving the \$10 billion bilateral trade target.

Mr Larijani also met NA Speaker Ayaz Sadiq at Parliament House, where they discussed parliamentary cooperation, regional security and opportunities for expanded economic engagement.

His trip follows a visit by Iranian parliament speaker Bagher Ghalibaf last month, marking the second senior Iranian delegation to Islamabad in weeks and underscoring intensified diplomatic activity between the neighbors amid shifting regional dynamics.

Iran and Pakistan share a long, often tense border where terrorist

groups have carried out attacks on both sides, prompting growing security coordination. Tehran has also offered to mediate between Islamabad and Kabul as cross-border tensions are rising.
