NEW YORK, February 27: Pakistani filmmaker Sharmeen Obaid Chinoy won the first ever Oscar

award for Pakistan for her documentary `**Saving Face**` at the 84th Academy Awards gala on Sunday.

Accepting the world's prestigious award, Ms Chinoy observed: "I want to dedicate this award to all the heroes working on the ground in Pakistan and to all the women in the country who are working for a change. Do not give up as this is your dream."

Oscar winner Sandra Bullock was seen weeping with joy during Ms Chinoy's acceptance speech.

'Saving Face' is a 52-minute documentary which talks about the plight of women subjected to acid attacks, and a doctor who comes to Pakistan to treat them and give them hope.

Due largely to its heart-wrenching subject



as well as the facts that its producer is not from a country known for making many quality films, `Saving Face` has been one of the more talked about nominations at the event.

The Daniel Junge and Sharmeen Obaid Chinoy documentary follows British plastic surgeon Dr Mohammad Jawad, who returns to Pakistan to help victims of acid burns. The documentary follows one woman as she fights to see that the perpetrators of the crime are imprisoned for life.

Iran to give \$250m for gas pipeline project

ISLAMABAD: Iran has agreed to export 80,000 barrels of crude oil per year to Pakistan and has also agreed to provide \$250 million for the Iran-Pakistan gas pipeline project, revealed Minister for Petroleum and Natural Resources Dr Asim Hussain on Tuesday.

In a special parliamentary committee meeting, Hussain told the committee members that Pakistan had asked for \$500 million but Iran agreed to only \$250 million.

He added that a Pakistani delegation will visit Iran in mid-March in connection with the project. The delegation will finalise the deal.

Banking industry to double its market share Islamic in next five years

Islamabad - Governor State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) Yaseen Anwar on Tuesday said Islamic banking in Pakistan is all set to double its market share in the next five years and the Islamic banks need to offer agriculture financing to tap the huge productive potential of the sector. Speaking as the chief guest at the 2nd International Conference on Islamic Business organised by the Riphah International University at National Institute of Banking and Finance (NIBAF), Governor SBP noted that the Islamic banking industry is growing at a fast pace and maintaining an average growth rate of 30 per cent over the past six years.

He said the Islamic banking industry's asset base has reached Rs641 billion which constitutes almost 8 per cent of the overall banking industry, while deposits represent 8.5 per cent of the banking system's deposits. Islamic banking network is also spread across the country at a significant pace with the total number of branches reaching 886, he said, adding the industry is still facing challenges and constraints that need to be addressed to sustain the growth momentum.

Free blood screening, diagnostic camps at Expo Centre

Karachi: The Pakistan Islamic Medical Association will organise free blood screening and diagnostic camps on March 2, the first day of its 22nd biennial international convention, at the Expo Centre. Chief coordinator of the PIMA convention Dr Sohail Akhtar told reporters on Tuesday that elaborate arrangements had been made to increase public awareness of noncommunicable diseases and provide short duration investigations and screening of blood to the public during the convention.

He said a public awareness session titled 'Take control of your own health' would be held from 3pm to 5pm on March 2, when Prof S.M. Rab, Prof A. Gaffar Billoo, Prof Ejaz Vohra, Prof Javaid A. Khan, Prof lqbal Afridi and Prof Huma Qureshi would speak on diabetes, diseases of children, heart diseases, tobacco and health, mental illness and hepatitis, respectively.

After the lectures people would be welcome to have free investigations and checkups for hepatitis, blood sugar, body mass index, bone mineral density, antenatal screening, breast cancer examinations and memory tests, he added. Dr Shahid Noor, the organising secretary of the convention, said the three-day convention would be



formally inaugurated by Prof Dr Attaur Rahman on March 3.

The convention, which would include a number of foreign experts, would be a mix of science, education, ethics, and religion and health advocacy. A session would also be dedicated to health policies and doctors issues, Dr Noor said, adding that in addition to 12 scientific sessions on mental health, immunisation, chest diseases, bone and joint diseases, dentistry, gynaecological oncology, urology, dermatology, diabetes mellitus, quality health care, various plenary lectures and six workshops would be held on March 4th.

Dr Ahmad Salman Ghauri, PIMA Karachi president, said the theme chosen for the convention reflected the need for all organisations working for the betterment of society to work in harmony. Experts from Jordan, Malaysia, the United States, the United Kingdom and Saudi Arabia were included among the 174 experts taking part in the convention, he added

Khan said that the commission was also considering making 10-15 per cent turnout rate of the women voters mandatory.

He said amendments would be introduced to curb the incidents of aerial firing in elections as well as trimming down election campaigning expenses by the candidates. Khan said that the electoral rolls would be published on May 25.

Pakistan views Khar-Clinton meet as 'positive, constructive'

Islamabad, Feb 24 (IANS) Pakistan Friday described the meeting between Foreign Minister Hina Rabbani Khar and US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton in London as "positive and constructive".

The Khar-Clinton's meeting Thursday came as relations between the two allies are strained on a variety of issues, especially since last year's killing of Al Qaeda chief Osama bin Laden at his hideout deep inside Pakistan and NATO strikes at two border checkposts killing 24 Pakistani soldiers.

The meeting was held on the sidelines of an international conference on Somalia. convened by British Prime Minister David Cameron, Xinhua reported.

Addressing a weekly press briefing, Pakistani Foreign Ministry spokesman Abdul Basit Friday said: "You will agree with me that Pakistan-US relations are important and we are trying to make these relations transparent and predictable."

"We are waiting for the completion of our parliamentary process. We will proceed further in the light of parliamentary guidelines," the spokesman said, referring to the review of future relationship with the US.



Pakistani bowlers get positive spin in rankings

The Pakistani spin duo of Saeed Ajmal and Abdul Rehman were rewarded for their matchwinning efforts against the world's number one-ranked test outfit England by moving up in the world bowling rankings released on Sunday.

Ajmal and Rehman destroyed the England batting on Saturday in the second Test here taking nine wickets between them as the English were all out for 72 in their second innings, their lowest total ever in tests against the Pakistanis.

It gave Pakistan an unassailable 2-0 lead in the three test series as they won by 72 runs.

Ajmal took 3-22 while Rehman recorded career best figures of 6-25 which saw the former rise one place to number two in the ICC (International Cricket Council) bowlers' rankings, while Rehman is in



ninth place after moving up five places and is in the top ten for the first time.

Ajmal - who also reached the landmark of 100 test wickets in only his 19th match trails number-one ranked Dale Steyn of South Africa by 84 points.

This is the first time in 23 years that two Pakistan spinners figure inside the top 10 of the Test player rankings. In September 1988, Abdul Qadir was ranked fifth and Iqbal Qasim 10th, the ICC said.

Rs137b TFCs to have positive impact for energy

KARACHI - The federal government has decided to issue Terms Finance Certificates (TFCs) worth Rs137 billion in, what the analysts believe, another attempt to ease liquidity problems of the energy sector. However, the industry grapevine is suggesting that the transaction is likely to be exhausted within couple of days. The transaction would clean the balance sheet and reduce short-term borrowing of the energy sector companies by Rs109 billion, while another Rs28 billion would be fresh injection in the system. For the banks, it would slightly reduce the nonperforming loans in short-term and may lead to one time positive impact on earnings. Overall, the transaction aims to revitalise the lending capability of the banking sector to the energy chain.

speakers and discussions of their choice, had to either return disappointed or just stand outside the rooms.

On Sunday, the second day of the festival, the organisers, to some extent solved the problem by fixing a giant video screen outside the biggest venue, the Ballroom, and a large number for whom there was no room left in the room, were seen crowding around the video screen and monitoring the proceedings inside. The hotel lobby was jampacked.

There were dozens of authors from the Pakistani diaspora who have made a mark for themselves in the field of authorship and literature in their adopted countries, most notable among them being Ayesha Jalal, an internationally-acclaimed historian and author, presently teaching at Tufts University, Boston, USA; and Hanif Kureishi, the Pakistan-origin London-based writer and playwright whose plays have been hits the world over.

Sunday, the closing day of the festival featured some highly intellectually invigorating and socially productive panel discussions. Among these. there was a discussion titled, "The emergence of Bangladesh: a military failure or the collapse of civil society", based on Sarmila Bose's book on the subject. It was a soulsearching expose of the circumstances that led to the December 1971 tragedy. Brigadier (retd) AR Siddiqui, came up with an objective analysis highlighting the political events in the period intervening from the general elections of December 1970 and the fall of Dhaka. So did noted journalist Khalid Ahmed, even though their views were divergent. The session saw some emotional exchanges when the discussion was thrown open to the gathering for questions and answers with some vehemently defending the Pakistani position in the conflict and others highlighting the blunders by the then government of Pakistan.

Then there was a discussion on literary criticism and Urdu clas-

sics. These were just some of the many discussions held on various literary subjects and social issues.

The festival finally came to an end with an interactive dialogue between Susan Nicklin, Director, Literature, of British Council, London, and Hanif Kureishi. Kureishi, in reply to Nicklin's question, said that his visit to Karachi and to the festival was a source of pleasure as he had seen for himself the desire and the urgency among the people of Pakistan, especially the young folk, to speak out unfettered about their country and other countries vis-à-vis Pakistan.

"We all know that politicians are a dishonest lot of people", he said, adding, "So one place where people can speak their minds out and vent their grievances against politicians are stories, and it is so nice to know that Pakistan is teeming with young highly promising writers. He said the effects of writing may not manifest themselves immediately and quoted the example of Charles Dickens, about whom he said, people iust didn't bother because they weren't even aware of what he was trying to put forth, but it was generations later that Dickens' writings brought about revolutionary changes in society. Writers, he said, tell you of what's going on in your neighbourhood.

"No writer exists on his own. He has to bank on what others say and feel. That is how culture develops", he said.

Martin Fryer, Director, Programmes, of British Council, said that these two days had turned out to be highly fruitful and lauded the work done by the OUP and his team at the British Council in organising such a successful event.

Ameena Saiyid, Managing Director of the Oxford University Press (Pakistan), thanked the British Council for their cooperation without which, she said holding such a mega event could not have been possible. She said that the festival was meant to showcase the tremendous store of talent in the country. She said that entry to the festival would continue to be free and announced that next year onwards, it would be a three-day festival. She also thanked her team immensely for their hard work in making the event a success and had special words of praise for Zehra Naseem and Raheela Baqai of the Oxford University Press.

Dr Asif Aslam Farrukhi, lauded the work done by the OUP and the British Council and said that the event, by all accounts was a resounding success. The closing speeches were followed by a musical programme by Salman Ahmed and his ensemble, Junoon.

The proceedings of the closing ceremony were conducted by Mahshud Rizvi, Director British Council in Sindh and Balochistan.


